

- Reconciliation.




At the TFN Youth Job Fair



Severing TFN and the beach front trail since the 1960's.



TRAILS BC

- The Trails Society of BC was formed to oversee the completion of the Trans Canada Trail (TCT) in BC.
- The Trails Society of BC has expanded to:
  - 1. Incorporate other trail connection needs across BC
  - 2. Explore a southern route for the TCT from Langley through Tsawwassen to Vancouver Island
  - 3. Support and assist Indigenous inclusion and trail projects
  - 4. Have Indigenous staff and board members
- For The Great Blue Heron Way:
  - 1. Hosts public website information and maps routes
  - 2. As a not-for-profit with charity status, applies for grants
  - 3. Has a mission and mandate that eventually puts the GBHW project under Indigenous control
