Re: Widening Project Highway 7 - 266th to 287th Street, Maple Ridge

Dear Minister Ma,

We write on behalf of the Maple Ridge/Pitt Meadows Local Committee of HUB Cycling, to urgently request your attention to the following matter.

The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure will be widening the last section of Highway 7 between Maple Ridge and Mission, between 266 and 287 St., and is presently working on the design.

Our local HUB Committee, together with several representatives of the regional HUB Cycling organization, met with the design team in September and subsequently provided our feedback on the preliminary design.

The significant concern we have with regard to this project is that the planned 2-meter-wide shoulder is inappropriately considered an "acceptable minimum width active transportation facility" by the design team<sup>1</sup>. According to the British Columbia Active Transportation Guidelines, both present and projected future traffic volumes and current speeds, as well as the high volume of truck traffic along this route, most definitely warrant separated facilities. A 2-meter shoulder along this busy, high speed highway is a daunting place to ride for even the most fearless riders. Such a dangerous space should never be considered "acceptable".

In July of this year, 24-year old Daphne Toumbanakis was killed while riding on the shoulder near this section of Highway 7 where it already had been widened to four lanes.<sup>2</sup> The shoulder on which Daphne tragically and needlessly lost her life is very similar to what is presently being planned.
